Convention 2011



ore than 5,600 attendees filled the halls and corridors of the Air Force Association's 2011 Air & Space Conference and Technology Exposition. It featured speeches by top USAF leaders and a record number of professional development sessions and briefings, in addition to a full array of aerospace and defense technology exhibits.

This year's conference took place Sept. 19-21 at the Gaylord National Resort and Convention Center overlooking the Potomac River, in National Harbor, Md., just outside Washington, D.C.

On Monday, Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Norton A. Schwartz launched the conference with opening remarks, presenting several of AFA's National Aerospace Awards alongside Air Force Secretary Michael B. Donley. Laurels included AFA's Citations of Honor, top crew and team awards, and Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve Command honors.

Fifty students from the US Air Force's Air Command and Staff College, Maxwell AFB, Ala., visited the conference and technology exposition and were joined for the first time by 130 airmen from Air Force Materiel Command, all thanks to financial support from Boeing and the KC-46 Tanker Team.

Visitors were hard-pressed to choose among a record 68 presentations, briefings, and panel discussions over the three-day conference. Topics ranged from strategy to terrorism to personal development, and featured newsmaker speeches and appearances by prominent figures from the Air Force past and present.

The technology expo grew as well, boasting displays from across industry and the Department of Defense. It featured 126 exhibitors, including a Boeing KC-46A cockpit and boom-operator station mock-up, an AgustaWestland AW 139 helicopter, BAE's Hawk jet aircraft training system trailer, and cockpit training simulators of Hawker Beechcraft's AT-6 and Rockwell Collins' KC-135 Block 45 cockpit upgrade.

The combined Air & Space Conference and Technology Expo drew some 73 members of the media, in addition to members of Air Force Public Affairs covering the event for internal communications.



The AFA National Convention was held Sept. 17-18. On Sunday morning, Sept. 18, AFA members and their guests assembled at the Air Force Memorial in Arlington, Va., for a solemn salute to those who died in the past year.

During the early morning service, AFA National Chaplain retired Maj. Gen. William J. Dendinger delivered a homily and Donley, CMSAF James A. Roy, and AFA Chairman of the Board S. Sanford Schlitt laid a wreath in memory of the dead. The Memorial Tribute, listing the names of 27 departed AFA members, was read by Schlitt, Justin M. Faiferlick, Vice Chairman of the Board for Field Operations, and George K. Muellner, Vice Chairman of the Board for Aerospace Education.

AFA lauded the Air Force's 12 Outstanding Airmen of the Year at a formal

awards dinner Sept. 19, preceded by an evening reception sponsored by Northrop Grumman.

At the dinner, Gen. Philip M. Breedlove, Air Force vice chief of staff, addressed the OAY "Golden Dozen" and their guests. Roy acted as master of ceremonies, and Maj. Gen. Cecil R. Richardson, Air Force chief of chaplains, offered an opening prayer. The United States Air Force Band entertained guests throughout the evening.

With generous support from ATK, the 12 Outstanding Airmen met with congressional leaders on Capitol Hill, visited the White House and Pentagon, and toured the monuments and memorials in and around Washington, D.C., throughout the week.

AFA's Air Force Anniversary Dinner was held Sept. 21, toasting the monu-



AFA Business

There were 209 registered delegates representing 35 states, the District of Columbia, Europe, and the Pacific region at the National Convention.

Delegates received a briefing on AFA's CyberPatriot program and listened to presentations by Kevin Estrem, President of the Lance P. Sijan Chapter, AFA's Chapter of the Year, and from retired Lt. Gen. John A. Bradley on his charity work in Afghanistan. Delegates also heard a recorded message from Rep. Clifford Stearns (R-Fla.), co-chair

approved change to the constitution on the search and nominating process. Delegates reviewed and unanimously approved AFA's annual Statement of Policy and Top Issues, as presented. The delegates also approved a Board recommendation to reject proposed changes to convention representation and voting procedures.
